In 2012, after months of hard work and dedication, Loresa finally passed her driving test and purchased a 2012 GMC Terrain. That same vendor modified her Terrain, and ARS assisted with financing.

For the next ten years, Loresa cherished her modified vehicle and used it to travel all over Arkansas. However, as with all machines, parts started to wear down and malfunction, and Loresa found herself back at Arkansas Rehabilitation Services seeking assistance for a new vehicle. She chose to purchase a 2022 GMC Terrain and, once again, reached out to the same vendor in Houston, Texas, that had helped her a decade earlier.

In May of 2023, Loresa was delivered her modified vehicle and couldn't be happier. She expressed her gratitude towards Arkansas Rehabilitation Services and her Walmart supervisor, who never stopped believing in her and supporting her dreams.
